

BUSHNELL'S TURTLE

A HISTORY OF SEA POWER By William Oliver Stevens Published by G. H. Doran Company, 1920, pg. 294

When Compatriot Green speaks on the American Turtle, he makes the point that this was first submarine every used for military attacks in world history. Young David Bushnell conceived of the idea as a college student while at Yale College. Several of his ideas were far ahead of the science of the day. His idea of using water as ballast was unique and still in use on modern day submarines. His idea of using a propeller in the shape of a screw was

unique and also in common use today. His use of a barometer to determine depth was most unique, and one of his biggest problems was something that would give light underwater in the dark so that the operator could determine his depth and course direction. problem, plus a force pump that would force water out of the turtle were his two biggest problems to solve. In the long run the biggest problem turned out to be to find a small, powerful man who could operate all the devices Bushnell designed into the turtle, and could also keep his emotions under control in the small, dark, wet environment of the David Bushnell was a sickly young man, who trained his brother to operate the turtle, but due to his unexpected sickness, and an emergency replacement had to be used to operate the turtle the first time it was used to attach a British ship

# This Month During The American Revolution October 22, 1777 Battle of Red Bank

On October 22, 1777, Fort Mercer, an earthen fort erected to guard the river approach to Philadelphia, was successfully defended by Americans in the Battle of the Red Bank. Their victory delayed the opening of the Delaware River as a route of supply for General Howe's army, which had occupied Philadelphia on September 26th.

## MONUMENT AT RED BANK.

In commemoration of the battle at Red Bank and the valor of Colonel Greene, a monument of blue veined marble, about fifteen feet high, was erected in 1829, just within the northern line of the outworks of Fort Mercer, and within a few feet of the margin of the Delaware. This tribute to the memory of valor and patriotism was made by some New Jersey and Pennsylvania volunteers. While it is a testimony of one of the most noble traits in human character, it bears an exhibition of the existence of another of the most detestable. In the

inscription were the words NEW JERSEY AND PENNSYLVANIA, in a single prominent line. Some Jersey scoundrel almost obliterated the word PENNSYLVANIA; and afterward some Pennsylvania Vandal, in the fierceness of his retaliatory zeal for the credit of his state, disgraced it, so far as insignificance could do it, by obliterating the words NEW JERSEY. The whole line is destroyed; and that marble shaft perpetuates remembrance of unknown barbarians as well as of honored patriots.
